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Natural Resources Conservation Districts

Natural Resources Conservation Districts (NRCs) are non-regulatory entities that work with private landowners, farms, state agencies, federal agencies, and other partner organizations to promote and implement conservation programs. In some parts of the United States, Conservation Districts may also be referred to as Water Conservation Districts, Soil and Water Conservation Districts, and Natural Resources Districts.

What services do Natural Resources Conservation Districts offer?

- Connect people, organizations, and resources to steward our land and water resources for the future. This includes training for young conservation leaders, developing comprehensive conservation plans, lake watershed action plans, and implementing projects.
- Assist agricultural producers with Nutrient Management Planning, water quality sampling, soil sampling, manure sampling, harvest and nutrient application record keeping, equipment rentals, and more.
- Host events and provide educational opportunities and assistance related to agricultural practices, water quality, invasive species, native species, tree planting, stormwater, lake shorelines, dam removal projects, and more.
- Work with community members to inform and create Local-Led Conservation initiatives and assist in administering Local-Led Funding Pools for prioritized conservation practices.
- Coordinate assistance and funding from all available sources—public, private, local, state, regional, and federal—to develop locally-driven solutions to natural resource concerns. This can mean coordination with other organizations, communities, municipalities, homeowners, landowners, land stewards, agricultural and forest producers, as well as businesses.
- Collaborate with other organizations in program implementation including many of the organizations in this guide along with other non-profits, conservation commissions, and local groups.
- Coordinate tree plantings through outreach, funding, planning, finding volunteers, installation, and maintenance. Many Conservation Districts also offer annual tree, plant, and/or fish sales.
- Together, Vermont's 14 Conservation Districts serve the entire state. We are foundational to the state's agricultural and conservation communities.

Organic Certification Cost Share Program

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM)



The Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food and Markets (VAAFM) offers **funding assistance** through the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Agricultural Marketing Service (AMS) **to organic producers** and handlers of agricultural products who have received organic certification through a USDA-accredited certifying agent.

Grant Award/Key Dates and Deadlines: Certified organic operations may receive reimbursement of up to 75% of their direct certification costs paid between October 1 and September 30 annually, not to exceed \$750 per certification scope. There are up to four eligible certification scopes (crops, livestock, wild crops, and handling), which must be individually inspected for organic certification to be eligible for reimbursement.

Reimbursement is available on a first-come, first-served basis. Reimbursement for organic transition is not currently available. Operations with suspended, revoked, or withdrawn certifications are also ineligible for cost share reimbursement.

Specialty Crop Block Grants are available to **enhance the competitiveness of Vermont specialty crops** including fruits, vegetables, tree nuts, herbs and spices, medicinal plants, honey, hops, maple syrup, mushrooms, and nursery crops including Christmas trees and floriculture. Projects funded through this grant program must benefit more than one specialty crop business, individual, or organization

Program Purpose:

Specialty Crop Block Grant Program (SCBGP) funds enhance the competitiveness of specialty crops by:

- Leveraging efforts to market and promote specialty crops
- Assisting producers with research and development relevant to specialty crops
- Expanding availability and access to specialty crops

USDA AMS supports projects that address the needs of U.S. specialty crop growers and strengthen local and regional food systems.

Farm to Institution Market Development Grants

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM)



The Farm to Institution Market Development Grant (formerly Local Food Market Development Grant) is **intended to support market development opportunities for local food producers, with a focus on Vermont institutional markets**. Funding is provided to help improve local producer access to, and engagement with, schools, hospitals, colleges, correctional facilities, and other local institutions.

Eligible proposals will increase institutional market opportunities for at least one Vermont farm business and increase the amount of local food purchased and served in Vermont institutions.

Competitive proposals will focus on collaboration, developing new sales relationships or deepening existing sales relationships, and values-based procurement for institutions serving meals to Vermont residents. Competitive proposals will demonstrate high likelihood of long-term, sustained partnership between Vermont farms and Vermont institutions.

Grant Awards: Range from \$10,000 to \$30,000.

Match Requirement: All applicants must demonstrate 25% of the total grant award in matching funds; the matching funds requirement can be met with cash, in-kind, or a combination of both.

Pesticide Programs and Resources

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets & UVM Extension



Professional and homeowner use of pesticides are regulated by this Division under the Vermont Rule for the Control of Pesticides. These regulations cover sales restrictions, proper use, storage, and disposal of pesticides. Product registration, applicator certification, dealer licenses, and permits may be required for use of certain pesticides, all of which are issued from this Division. Homeowners and professionals are responsible for following the directions on product labels and for properly disposing of all unused pesticides.

Best Management Practice (BMP) Program

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM)



The Best Management Practice (BMP) Program provides **technical and financial assistance** to identify & assess **farmstead water quality** concerns, and to assist farmers in implementing **structural improvements** designed to abate agricultural waste discharges to Vermont waters. Program staff aim to help Vermont farmers achieve and maintain regulatory compliance in a way that benefits water quality and farm viability.

Technical Assistance (TA) is available on a priority basis at no cost to the farmer. TA includes a combination of agricultural, civil, and environmental engineering consultation and design. VAAFM engineers are available to provide water quality compliance consultations, and to assist with state permitting and variances.

State BMP Program

Financial assistance is available for farmers implementing structural practices on farmsteads that improve water quality. All practices must be designed and/or approved by a VAAFM engineer prior to project funding or implementation. Payment rates are up to 90% of eligible costs.

State payment cannot exceed any of the following rates:

- **\$100,000 per farm operation**
- Award amount listed on the grant agreement
- **90% of the total sum of expenses** listed on receipts & invoices

EQIP-Assist BMP

Financial assistance is available for farmers implementing a water quality project through the USDA-NRCS' Environmental Quality Incentive Program (EQIP). Payment rates, between combined federal and state contributions, are up to 90% of eligible costs, or \$200,000 per farm operation. Applications are accepted on a rolling basis. We suggest applying when a farmer has ranked out for an NRCS EQIP contract.

Examples of eligible practices include: Barnyard runoff collection, bedded pack facility, composting stack pad, clean water diversion (e.g. gutters, ditches, French drains), manure storage systems, milk house waste collection & treatment, silage leachate collection

Capital Equipment Assistance Program (CEAP)

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM)



Financial assistance for new or used innovative **equipment** that will aid in the reduction of surface runoff of agricultural wastes to state waters, **improve water quality** of state waters, reduce odors from manure application, separate phosphorus from manure, mitigate greenhouse gases, and reduce costs to farmers when they apply manure.

Equipment Purpose & Examples of Eligible Equipment	Anticipated Funding Rates
Precision Agriculture - To improve nutrient management planning and precision nutrient application. Examples include flow meters, yield sensors, and precision planting equipment.	90% cost-share up to \$25,000 per applicant
Liquid Waste Management – To reduce nutrient runoff, improve efficiency, and follow NMP recommendations when applying liquid waste. Examples include injection toolbars, dragline hoses and reels, flowmeters, manure sensors, and waste irrigation equipment.	90% cost-share up to \$70,000 or 90% cost-share up to \$150,000 per custom applicator or nonprofit.
Conservation Tillage – To reduce the frequency or intensity of tillage operations. Examples include no-till planters, grain drills, and planter downforce.	90% cost-share up to \$50,000 per applicant
Cover Crop Equipment – To increase or improve cover cropping implementation. Examples include no-till grain drill and roller crimpers.	
Bedded Pack Management - To enable or improve intentional and effective management of bedded packs. Examples include bedding chopper, row/compost turners, and bedded pack tillage equipment.	
Feed Management – To address silage leachate issues in feed bunks. Examples include balers/wrappers to enable feed bunk decommissioning.

Farm Agronomic Practices (FAP) Program

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM)



The Farm Agronomic Practices (FAP) Program utilizes state funding to help Vermont farms implement **soil-based agronomic practices** that improve soil quality, increase crop production, and reduce erosion and agricultural waste discharges.

Conservation Practice	Payment Rate
Cover Crop	\$55/acre if planted before Oct. 1 \$40/acre if planted Oct. 1-10
Crop to Hay	\$60/acre
No Till Crop Planting	\$15/acre
No Till Pasture and Hayland Renovation	\$30/acre
Rotational Grazing	\$30/acre
Manure Injection	\$30/acre

Grants are limited to a maximum of \$10,000 per farm operation per calendar year.

All applications due at least one month (30 days) prior to practice implementation. Enrolled farmers must fill out a Claim Form with corresponding maps to implemented practices no later than December 15. Sooner is better and will result in more timely payment.

Farm Agronomic Practices (FAP) Agronomic Training Grant

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM)



The Farm Agronomic Practice (FAP) grant program from the Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM) **provides instructional activity grants to support Vermont farmers and service providers to attend events that further their knowledge of agricultural water quality.**

This grant supports Vermont farmers and agricultural service providers to attend in-state, out-of-state, or international educational events that focus on at least one of the following:

- State and federal agricultural water quality regulations,
- The impacts of agricultural waste on water quality, and/or
- Best practices to reduce agricultural impacts on water quality.

Activities must be primarily instructional. Attendance at lobbying or advocacy-focused events is ineligible. Individuals representing organizations with active agreements that support education and outreach through the Agricultural Clean Water Initiative Program (AgCWIP) may be considered ineligible for funding under this program. Similarly, attendance at events sponsored by AgCWIP may be considered ineligible. Costs for food, drink, and entertainment are ineligible for reimbursement. All applications and expenses are subject to review by VAAFM to ensure that they meet eligibility requirements and that costs are reasonable.

Seeding and Filter Strip Program (SFS)

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM)



The Seeding and Filter Strip (SFS) grant program provides **technical and financial assistance to support the long-term installation of perennial vegetation**. The goal is to help **reduce soil erosion & agricultural runoff**, preventing this runoff from reaching waterbodies. The program funds the establishment of filter strips, pasture/hay plantings, grassed waterways, and associated infrastructure (e.g. erosion or grade control structures), prioritizing seeding down areas which present a significant water quality concern. All practices implemented under the SFS program can be harvested for hay.

Eligibility

- Applicant must be a Vermont farm required to comply with the Required Agricultural Practices (RAPs).
- Applicant must control the enrolled land either through ownership or a lease that covers the maintenance agreement period of 10 years.
- Land must be in active use, as defined in 32 V.S.A. § 3752(15), and within 300 ft of surface water or a ditch.
- Land must be currently maintained as 1) annual cropland, 2) pasture or hayland with a prior history in annual crops within the past five years, or 3) a buffer zone as required by the RAPs.
- Project must meaningfully address on-site natural resource concerns.

Pasture and Surface Water Fencing (PSWF) Program

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM)



The Pasture and Surface Water Fencing (PSWF) Program provides **pasture management technical assistance and financial assistance** to Vermont farmers to improve water quality and on-farm livestock exclusion from surface waters statewide.

Technical Assistance: No-cost pasture management technical assistance from experienced grazing specialists.

Financial assistance: Reimbursements up to 90% of the cost to install infrastructure that will improve pasture management, up to the farm's grant amount.

Projects must implement practices that support at least one of the following:

- Excluding livestock from surface waters
- Implementing a Rotational Grazing Plan
- Priority is given to farms that have at least 4 acres for the raising, feeding and management of at least five cattle or cows, 15 goats or sheep, four equine, or three camelids
- Manage pastureland where water quality will benefit from implementation of improved pasture management and eligible and/or necessary conservation practices
- Have ownership or land control for the lifespan of the practice (10 years)
- Have an insurance policy that allows the State and its employees and officers to be listed as additional insured

Grant Award: Up to \$15,000 grant award per farm.

Additional funding is available for exclusion fence only, up to \$20,000 total grant award, as approved by PSWF program.

Vermont Pay for Performance (VPFP) Program

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM)



The Vermont Pay for Performance (VPFP) Program is a state-funded initiative that provides financial incentives and technical support to farms implementing conservation practices and improving water quality outcomes by reducing edge-of-field phosphorus losses. Most current payment programs pay cost-share for practices only. The VPFP program is unique because it also pays for the outcomes of those practices: it recognizes that the conservation of soil and water generates value to the public and directly compensates farms for that value.

Practices include cover crop, crop rotation, pasture and hay planting, reduced till, no till, manure injection, manure incorporation, nutrient management, and rotational/prescribed grazing.

Farmers will use the Farm Phosphorus Reduction Planner (FarmPREP), a web-application tool that integrates farm management data, agronomic and hydrologic science, and numerical modeling to evaluate reductions in P losses across their farm operation. Each participating farm will be assigned an individual Technical Assistance Provider to support data entry, conservation planning, and program participation.

Payment Opportunities

Participating farms may receive annual payments in three categories:

- **Data Entry Payment** (up to \$3,000/year) calculated at \$50/field. Data entry will occur with support from an assigned Technical Assistance Provider.
- **Practice Payment** (up to \$10,000/year) payment calculated using a \$/acre payment rate for installing different field-by-field conservation practices.
- **Stewardship/Performance Payment** (up to \$30,000/year) calculated on a \$/acre payment rate for minimizing whole-farm phosphorus loss. Payment rates increase linearly as pounds of P_2O_5 per acre across the farm decrease.

The maximum possible yearly payment is **\$43,000**.

Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP)

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM)



Vermont's Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) is a voluntary program designed to **reduce sediment runoff and improve water quality and wildlife habitat** by removing land from agricultural production and **establishing vegetative buffers**. State and federal FSA funds are used to compensate landowners for the loss of productive agricultural land through **upfront incentive payments** and annual rental payments based on the total acreage dedicated to vegetated filter strips, forested buffers, or grassed waterways.

Program Definitions

- A **filter strip** is a grassed area that helps reduce sediment, nutrient, and pollutants in runoff.
- A **forested** buffer contains trees and/or shrubs in addition to a filter strip to reduce runoff losses, provide enhanced wildlife habitat, stabilize streambanks and create shade to lower water temperatures.
- A **grassed waterway** is a shallow vegetated swale designed to convey concentrated runoff to surface waters without causing erosion.

Grant Award Information:

- Upfront payments of \$415 per acre for pasture and hay land, and \$795 to \$1,905 per acre for annual cropland
- Implementation cost-share up to 100%. Annual payments \$80 - \$300 per acre per year
- Other project-related practices may be eligible for cost-share, such as fence, pipeline, watering facility, and stream crossing

Working Lands Enterprise Initiative Grant Programs

Working Lands Enterprise Initiative (WLEI)



The Working Lands Enterprise Initiative (WLEI) offers grants that support forest, farm, and food businesses. Grants also go to producer associations, business assistance provider organizations, and more. The state's annual budget process decides the amount of funds available each year. The Working Lands Enterprise Board (WLEB) meets each summer to decide which grants to offer for the coming year based on available funds and needs across Vermont.

In Fiscal Year 2027, a total of \$1 million is available for grants. Applications will open throughout the fall and winter, with awards announced throughout the winter and spring. These awards should be for projects that you will start working on in spring 2027. Except where noted, most projects are expected to be completed within one year. Unlike in past years, there will be no match requirement for these grants. Because funds are limited and these grants are very competitive (less than 20% of requested funds are usually awarded), you should apply for the minimum amount needed for a project.

Trade Show Assistance Grants

Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets (VAAFM)



The Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets' Trade Show Assistance Grants provide Vermont agricultural and forestry businesses with **funds to exhibit and sell their Vermont products at trade shows targeting out-of-state buyers**. These matching grants can partially offset the expenses associated with exhibiting at trade shows, which provide excellent opportunities to network with wholesale buyers and expand into new domestic and international markets.

Eligibility

Vermont-based agricultural and forestry businesses that meet the following criteria are eligible to receive funds through this grant:

1. Business is registered with the Vermont Secretary of State and has been in business for over one year
2. Business or its headquarters are located within Vermont
3. Business has three or more wholesale accounts
4. Business' products uses ingredients/raw materials grown in Vermont

Proposed trade shows target out-of-state buyers. Typically, trade shows based in Vermont would not be eligible. However, there are exceptions in which regional, or even international, trade shows happen to be held here. These shows are eligible if they meet the other requirements in this RFA. Please contact the grant program manager with questions.

Funding will be used for the following approved expenses:

- Travel and accommodation expenses
- Marketing materials and other marketing costs (samples, printing, etc.)
- Marketing, branding, and design services
- Registration fees (including booth space and educational sessions)

Business Enhancement Grant

Working Lands Enterprise Initiative (WLEI)



The Business Enhancement Grant Program administered by the Working Lands Enterprise Initiative provides funding opportunities for a wide array of businesses or entities which produce or use Vermont-based farm and forest products.

Eligibility

This grant is for Vermont working lands businesses/organizations, which include farms producing food and/or fiber and forest products businesses. Some food businesses/organizations, as well as agriculture or wood processing and/or distribution businesses can be eligible if they meet the ingredient/raw material sourcing requirements. Any food, processing, or distribution applicant must make their Vermont product sourcing clear in the application.

Service Provider & Producer Association Grants

Working Lands Enterprise Initiative (WLEI)



The Working Lands Enterprise Initiative (WLEI) Service Provider & Producer Association Grant is a competitive grant administered by the Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets. It supports organizations and producer associations that provide business-focused services to Vermont's farm, food, forest, and fiber sectors, with the goal of strengthening the state's working lands economy through technical assistance, skills development, and network-building support.

This grant is for two types of applicants:

1. Service providers, which are organizations that provide business support services to agricultural and forestry businesses.
2. Producer associations, also known as trade associations, industry trade groups, or business associations, are organizations founded and funded by businesses that operate in a specific industry. Vermont-based producer association groups that represent and promote Vermont agriculture, food, beverage, forest, or fiber products are eligible to apply.

Service provider grant projects should provide direct services to Vermont-based working lands businesses through technical assistance and/or other forms of support. Producer association grant projects may also provide these services to their members. These services include: market development, marketing plans, and sales planning, business and financial planning, disaster preparedness to flooding, and/or other crises, succession planning for next generation business owners, access to capital, manufacturing efficiencies or process flow, business research and development, workforce development.

- **Available funds:** Up to \$300,000 is available to award
- Award minimum is \$10,000. The maximum amount is TBD, but will likely be capped somewhere between \$40,000-\$75,000. No matching funds are required for this grant.
- All projects will start in winter/spring 2027, and will last about 15 months.

Diesel Emissions Reduction Financial Assistance

Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation



Vermont Diesel Emissions Reduction Financial Assistance was developed to **provide technical assistance and incentive funding for projects that reduce diesel emissions** from engines, vehicles, and equipment in Vermont with the goals of reducing public exposure to emissions from diesel-powered engines and the associated risks to public health and the environment.

The DEC periodically solicits applications from potential project partners for projects that achieve significant reductions in diesel emissions from diesel powered engines, vehicles, and equipment operating in Vermont.

What projects are eligible?

Certified vehicle or equipment replacement with all-electric (battery, grid, or fuel cell), alternative fuel, or newer diesel options; certified engine replacements; clean alternative fuel conversions; verified emission control technologies such as exhaust controls, cleaner fuels, and engine upgrades; verified idle reduction technologies such as auxiliary power units, fuel operated heaters, shore connection systems, transport refrigeration unit (TRU) electrified parking spaces, and truck stop electrification technologies; and/or verified aerodynamic technologies and low rolling resistance tires.

Cost Share Opportunities

There are a number of eligibility and cost share requirements. Cost share requirements vary depending on the project. For example, the program can fund up to 45% of the cost of replacing a heavy-duty diesel truck with a new, zero tailpipe exhaust vehicle (grid, battery, or fuel cell), while up to 25% of the cost of the truck's replacement with a newer, cleaner diesel, hybrid, or alternative fuel vehicle can be funded under this program. Use Value Appraisal (Current Use) Program

Vermont Department of Forests, Parks & Recreation (FPR)



Vermont's Current Use Program **enables eligible private landowners who practice long-term forestry or agriculture** to have their land appraised based on the property's value of production of wood or food rather than its residential or commercial development value.

Eligibility:

- Parcels must contain at least 25 acres that will be enrolled and managed according to a forest plan approved by the VT FPR.
- For most forestlands on productive soils (Site I, II and III), the primary management objective must be long-term production of forest products in accordance with established forest practices. Wildlife habitat, aesthetics, recreation, etc. are acceptable objectives when consistent with and complementary to timber management. Significant wildlife habitats, special places and sensitive sites, miscellaneous inclusions of one acre or less, and Ecologically Significant Treatment Areas (ESTAs) may also qualify without timber production.
- Open/idle agricultural land (not eligible for Agriculture Use Value) that is not to be reforested within two years may also be enrolled but cannot exceed 20% of total enrolled qualifying acreage (open/idle ag land plus forested acres on productive soils).
- Site IV land: Also called non-productive soils; land having soils incapable of growing a minimum amount of wood.

Not Eligible:

- House sites and land under other private or commercial developments
- A minimum of two acres surrounding dwellings including houses, camps, and mobile homes
- Land used for commercial mining or removal of gravel
- Any forested areas where the landowner chooses not to harvest trees, unless enrolled as an ESTA
- Any utility right-of-way in excess of two acres and wider than 40 ft
- Any land where vegetation is not under the legal control of the landowner may not be enrolled

Forest Legacy Program

Vermont Department of Forests, Parks, and Recreation



The Forest Legacy Program (FLP) is a federal grant program administered in partnership with the states to protect forestlands from conversion to non-forest uses. Landowners may either sell their property in fee simple (all rights) or convey a conservation easement while retaining ownership of the land. Conservation easements protect important public values – including productive forests, wildlife habitat, clean water, and dispersed pedestrian public access for activities such as hunting, fishing, trapping, walking, and snowshoeing – while allowing the land to remain in private ownership and continue to be managed as a working forest. The program offers an important funding opportunity for the permanent conservation of private forestland.

How Does It Work?

The Forest Legacy Program provides for up to 75% of the costs of a conservation easement or fee-simple acquisition, including appraisals, surveys, title work, closing costs, and other eligible acquisition expenses. The remaining 25% must be provided by the landowner or another non-federal partner, such as a land trust or other nonprofit organization. Nonprofit partners—including national, statewide, and local land trusts—play an important role in Vermont's Forest Legacy Program by serving as project proponents and working with interested landowners to develop competitive applications.

Key Dates and Deadlines

Preapplications are typically due in May, reviewed and ranked by the VT Forest Stewardship Committee in August, with federal deadline typically in mid-September.

Portable Bridge Rental Program

Vermont Department of Forests, Parks & Recreation (FPR)



FPR's Watershed Forestry Program has multiple **temporary bridge options available for direct rental** to logging contractors, consulting foresters, and landowners for use on stream crossings during harvesting activities. These bridges are designed to accommodate skidders, forwarders, and / or log trucks, with multiple lengths available to accommodate varying stream channel widths and crossing scenarios.

Wood-Over-Steel Skidder Bridges:

FPR has three, 25' long, two-section steel I-beam bridges with wooden decks. These bridges have engineer ratings and will hold a 30,000 lb. skidder or a 40,000 lb. forwarder over a 21-foot span. These bridges have also been used for log trucks with additional support under the bridge. They are heavy, requiring larger equipment to move than 20' wooden skidder bridges, but work very well. The monthly rental for these bridges is \$100 per month and there is a \$500 rental deposit also required. These bridges are located in Barre, Springfield and Rutland. Rental of the bridges is administered by the Watershed Forester. These bridges were funded through a grant from the US Forest Service.

Steel Truck Bridges:

FPR has four temporary truck bridges that are designed for log trucks and are rated for 99,000 lbs. These are engineered bridges purchased from ADM Fabricating in Pennsylvania. FPR has two 30' and two 40' bridges. They weigh between 17,000 and 27,000 lbs. and are one piece that folds during transport. These are substantial bridges and require at least one, and sometimes two medium or large excavators to load, unload and set in place. They also require a solid abutment to be set on, so they don't twist. The monthly rental for these bridges is \$100 per month and there is a \$500 rental deposit also required. The rental of the bridges is administered by the Watershed Forester. Contact Dave Wilcox for locations and availability. Two of these bridges were funded through an agreement with the USFWS, and two bridges were funded through State of Vermont Clean Water Funds.

Services that county foresters can provide include:

Site Visits: County Foresters can walk your woods with you, point out tree species and habitat features, and talk through your management goals—whether that's producing timber, improving wildlife habitat, enhancing recreation, or simply keeping your woods healthy. While they can't take on full management work for individual landowners, they are an important first step in connecting you to the right resources. They can provide referrals to licensed consulting foresters and other natural resource professionals who can develop Forest Management Plans or carry out projects on your land.

Programs: In addition to site visits, County Foresters administer state programs that support landowners. A key role is overseeing the Use Value Appraisal (Current Use) program for enrolled forestland, which allows land to be taxed based on its forestry value rather than its development value—making long-term forest stewardship more affordable.

Education and Outreach: County Foresters are also active in education and outreach. They regularly give talks, lead woods walks, and partner with schools, nonprofits, and community groups to build public understanding of forestry and forest stewardship. Their expertise covers a wide range of topics, from sustainable timber harvesting practices to invasive species management, wildlife habitat planning, and recreational trail improvements.

By providing technical assistance, connecting landowners with resources, and administering key state programs, County Foresters have long played a central role in helping Vermonters care for their forestland—ensuring that these lands continue to provide economic, ecological, and community benefits for generations to come.

Historic Barn Preservation Grants

Vermont Agency of Commerce and Community Development



Established in 1992, the State-funded Barn Preservation Grant program helps individuals, municipalities, and non-profit organizations to rehabilitate the historic agricultural buildings that are a symbol of Vermont's rural landscape. Since its inception, the program has provided over \$5 million towards the preservation of over 525 projects on historic barns and agricultural buildings around the state. This is the oldest state-funded agricultural-based grant program in the United States

Grant Award: Up to \$20,000, with a 1:1 Match Requirement.

Eligibility Requirements

- Property must be at least 50 years old and listed or determined eligible for listing in the State Register of Historic Places
- Project cannot start until grant has been awarded
- Barn does not have to be in use
- Funds: historic barn preservation, repairs and/or restoration
- Ineligible: New construction, additions, accessibility and code improvements, electrical, plumbing, heating, planning projects

Criteria & Ranking

All applications must meet Criteria 1-4. Criteria 5-10 are used to rank applications and award funds.

1. Property must be listed or eligible for listing in the State Register of Historic Places
2. Project buildings must be a historic agricultural building
3. Applicant must match the grant on at least a one-to-one basis
4. Projects must demonstrate compliance with preservation standards
5. Projects that preserve historic features
6. Active agricultural use or repair for agricultural purposes
7. Public benefit and long-term use
8. Architectural or historic significance
9. Long-term planning & budget
10. Clear, concise, and well-written applications

The Bird-Friendly Maple Program is ready to give you and maple-lovers everywhere a way to support and **promote sugarbush management that's good for Vermont's birds, forests, and forest-based economy.**

The program is a collaboration with the VT Department of Forests, Parks, and Recreation and the Vermont Maple Sugar Maker's Association. Through the Bird-Friendly Maple program, producers are recognized for their efforts to integrate bird habitat and biodiversity conservation into their sugarbush management through unique labeling and marketing opportunities.

Enrollment and Assessment

- To participate in the Bird-Friendly Maple program, producers must have either a current (within the past 10 years) Forest Management Plan written by a VT licensed forester, or a Habitat Management Plan written by Audubon staff.

Management

- Harvesting of trees in the sugarbush during the bird nesting season (May to mid-July) may reduce nest success and survivorship. In order to reduce negative impact on nesting birds, any one area of the sugarbush must not be worked in during the nesting season more than once every ten years.
- The sugarbush must be part of a contiguous forest block of greater than or equal to 100 acres.
- Considerate management and tapping in natural communities where maple is an associate species.
- Control or eradication for non-native or invasive species must be described in the forest management plan.
- Forests must be managed for diverse structure and regeneration, with a diversity of tree sizes and ages, and a diversity of vegetative layers (understory, midstory, groundlayer) as well as standing dead trees (snags) and downed woody debris.

There are additional program standards set by Audubon Vermont.

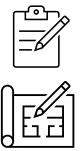

Farmworker Replacement Housing Loan Program Overview

- FWHR consists of a loan of up to \$120,000 to the cost of building new housing for farmworkers in circumstances warranting replacement of existing farmworker housing. The FWHR loan is interest and payment free throughout the life of the loan. The first \$30,000 of the loan is forgiven at the rate of \$3000/year over ten years provided that the housing remains in use as farmworker housing, while the remaining \$90,000 is deferred from repayment until refinance or sale of the property. 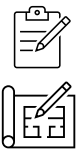

Farmland Conservation Program

Vermont Housing & Conservation Board (VHCB)



Proceeds from the sale of development rights has contributed to renewed vitality in agriculture, **enabling young farmers to purchase farms** at an affordable price and helping established farmers to reduce long-term debt, invest in infrastructure, make operations more profitable and efficient or to retire. At the same time that some larger dairy farms have consolidated, smaller farms are becoming stronger through diversification, by producing for specialty markets, and by minimizing costs of production. By focusing on conserving contiguous blocks of farmland in traditional farming communities, VHCB's Farmland Conservation Program helps to ensure that farms are not isolated by residential development and communities can continue to **support a healthy range of businesses** that serve and rely on neighboring farms.

How It Works:

The Board evaluates farmland applications in a two-step process: Pre-applications are submitted by an eligible entity (typically a land trust) and reviewed by a committee comprised of staff from VHCB, the Natural Resources Conservation Service, the Vermont Agency of Agriculture, the Vermont Department of Environmental Conservation, and land trust partners. If the project meets VHCB's eligibility criteria, it is approved for VHCB cost-share of an appraisal to determine the value of the conservation easement. Applications for funding are developed for those projects that have been approved as pre-applications and submitted for consideration at one of the Board's regularly scheduled meetings. Board evaluation is based upon soil quality, location, farm infrastructure, management, and other resources brought to the project

Key Partners Include:

- The Vermont Land Trust and the Upper Valley Land Trust to work directly with farmers interested in conserving their land
- VHCB's Farm & Forest Viability Program provides business planning and technical assistance to farm and food, forestry and forest products businesses
- The Vermont Land Trust's Farmland Access Program connects farmers with affordable farmland, often matching younger farmers to conserved land to lower acquisition costs

Vermont Farm & Forest Viability Program

Vermont Housing & Conservation Board (VHCB)



The Viability Program offers **business planning**, **succession planning**, and **technical assistance** to enterprises that keep Vermont's working landscape in production.

How It Works:

The Viability Program matches participants with advisors who have the specific skills to meet their needs. The Viability Program contracts these advisors to provide on-site, one-on-one, custom-tailored assistance for participants. Services are provided free of charge following a \$75 enrollment fee. Participants who have completed the program may also be able to re-enroll in the Viability Program as their business evolves.

Services:

The Viability Program provides a range of services, from in-depth long-term business planning to short-term specialized assistance, including: business planning, enterprise analysis, financial record-keeping and management, marketing and sales, human resources management management coaching, retirement & ownership succession planning

Eligibility

For all businesses:

- The owner(s) is year-round Vermont resident, currently operating the business in Vermont
- The owner(s) is actively involved in the day-to-day management of the business
- The owner(s) has at least two years' experience managing the current business

For farm businesses:

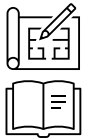
- The business has grossed at least \$15,000 in the most recent tax year

For food and forest businesses:

- For food businesses there is an added requirement that these businesses must be primarily involved in adding value to Vermont agricultural products
- For forest products businesses there is an added requirement that these businesses must be primarily involved in the harvesting, production, processing, storage, marketing, and/or distribution of local forest products.

Water Quality Grants

Vermont Housing & Conservation Board (VHCB)



The Vermont Housing & Conservation Board Farm and Forest Viability Program provides grants of up to \$50,000 to help Vermont farmers invest in water quality related on-farm infrastructure and improve water quality over a long period of time. Funding will prioritize projects that have both a direct and substantial water quality benefit and have other significant benefits to the farm and/or community, such as long-term farm viability, improved soil health, improved working conditions, climate adaptation or mitigation, etc.

Projects must directly impact water quality and must be for long-term investments rather than annual practices or improvements with a short life span including construction or renovation projects, long-term infrastructure improvements, and equipment. VHCB awards may be used as a cost share with other state or federal programs such as NRCS-EQIP, VAAFM BMP, and VAAFM CEAP.

Eligible Project Types Include:

- **Construction:** Construction, renovation, upgrades, or expansions to farm facilities. Examples include manure pits, barn or barnyard construction that will reduce runoff.
- **Equipment:** Eligible equipment will serve as a long-lived capital asset, essential to the business, is frequently used, and cannot be easily rented. Examples include no-till seeders and manure injectors.
- **Conservation-related Improvements:** May include long-term infrastructure to improve grazing and/or soil health, such as fencing, laneways, and buffer plantings.

Grant awards: between \$5,000 and \$50,000

Required components include:

- Project budget
- Financial statements, including a Current Balance Sheet, Historical Income Statement or Profit and Loss, and Projection or Cash Flow
- Map of the operation showing where the proposed project will be located and on-farm surface waters
- Quotes

Vermont Farmer Emergency Fund

Northeast Organic Farming Association of Vermont (NOFA-VT)



The NOFA Vermont Farmer Emergency Fund is available to assist Vermont certified organic and NOFA-VT member commercial farmers who are in financial need after having been adversely affected by natural and unnatural disasters such as crop failure, field flooding, fire, barn collapse, etc.

Fund Uses

- The fund may be used to help replace infrastructure (for example greenhouse, barn, fencing), seed, feed, livestock, equipment and other losses caused by the disaster.
- The fund may be used to help pay outstanding farm-related bills and immediate needs (loan and mortgage repayments, etc.).
- The fund is not an alternative to insurance and does not cover losses that are covered by a successful insurance claim or losses covered by other sources.
- The fund may not be used to cover projected income from crops lost from the disaster.

Grant Awards

- \$2,500 grants are available for commercial farmers who are NOFA-VT members.
- \$5,000 grants are available to any farm that is VOF certified organic. Because we want to incentivize organic certification, and because of the commitment involved in getting certified, we will waive the one-year waiting period for certified organic farms.

Successful applicants will be notified as soon as possible. Applications will be accepted on an ongoing basis and reviewed by a loan review committee with representatives from the NOFA-VT staff and the NOFA-VT Board of Directors. Once the application is received, you should receive notification of the committee's decision within two weeks.

Vermont Family Farmer of the Month

The Vermont Family Farmer of the Month Fund makes a financial award to Vermont farmers each month. Awards recognize farmers whose businesses are contributing to a **resilient Vermont agricultural landscape** and demonstrate **environmental stewardship** through sustainable practices.

Eligibility

Funds support innovative projects that will improve the viability of the recipient's enterprise. An example of an eligible project could be an upgrade or construction of a farm stand or wash and pack station, improvements in on-farm energy efficiency or integration of renewable energy, infrastructure design or construction for a new farm product, or an investment in soil or animal health.

Farmer Resilience Grants

Northeast Organic Farming Association of Vermont (NOFA-VT)



NOFA-VT's Farmer Resilience Grant program aims to **fund projects that will improve longer-term resilience on farms**. NOFA-VT definition of 'resilience' is framed broadly around their mission: to promote organic practices to build an economically viable, ecologically sound, and socially just Vermont agricultural system that benefits all living things.

Applications will be ranked using the following criteria and factors:

- Whether the farm uses organic practices, is certified organic, or in the process of achieving certification
- How the project will improve at least one form of 'resilience' as defined by NOFA-VT: NOFA-VT's definition of resilience is framed around their mission: to promote organic practices to build an economically viable, ecologically sound, and socially just Vermont agricultural system
- Long-term impact of project
- Community Impact
- Barriers that the farmer or farm has faced that have prevented them from receiving funding. This may include social barriers such as access to farming networks, discrimination faced in accessing support, long term land access barriers, financial and education program barriers.
- Whether the proposed project reflects a realistic budget and timeline

Applications are reviewed anonymously (names of farms and farmers removed before review) by a committee of Vermont farmers and farm workers.

We are still accepting multi-farm applications. **If you have a team of farms applying, you may request up to \$5,000 per farm, with a maximum total request of \$20,000.** For example, if you have four farms applying together on a collaborative project, you may apply for up to \$20,000.

Projects are expected to be completed by December 31st, 2027.

Journey Farmer

Northeast Organic Farming Association of Vermont (NOFA-VT)



The Journey Farmer Program is a **year-long program for farmers** who are in the **first few years** of running their own farm business in Vermont. The program is shaped by the farming interests and goals of the Journey Farmer participants and enables new farmers to advance their farming skills and experiences while being a part of a **cohort learning community of other beginning farmers and farmer mentors**.

A goal setting session takes place in the spring to start the program. During the growing season participants receive one farm visit from a NOFA-VT farm business advisor, and have the option to join monthly farm tours on established farms. In the late fall and winter the time commitment is roughly one meeting each month from November through March that includes farmer presenters as well as working sessions and relationship building with fellow participants. Participants will also be matched with a farmer mentor for production support and receive climate resilience planning support including a small implementation grant.

- Identify your farm, business, and quality of life goals over the next 3 to 5 years
- Create an implementation plan to support you in meeting your goals
- Refine your approach to business and financial planning
- Further develop your marketing plans and your systems for implementing the plan

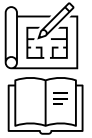

- **Short-Term Financial Analysis and Planning**, including enterprise analyses and cash flow planning are available to mature agricultural businesses who enroll in the Vermont Farm & Forest Viability Program.
- **In-Depth Agricultural Business Advising:** Our clients have access to roughly 2-years of tailored advising with farm, food and forest business advisors. Planning and advising topics include financial record-keeping, cash flow management, marketing, sales, new product development, capital improvements, accessing financing, accessing land, employee management.

Your advisor conducts on-farm meetings for approximately one year. Together, we explore possible management and enterprise changes that could increase profitability. This process produces a written business plan for the farm, and in the second year of participation, farmers are provided with additional technical assistance and help updating their plans.

Our Farm Viability Program provides retirement and ownership succession planning to clients enrolled in the Vermont Farm & Forest Viability Program, through the Vermont Housing and Conservation Board.

Your advisor will work with you to create a farm transfer plan. We will assess the current situation, examine your goals and help you to consider the issues involved with succession. The transfer plan will provide you with resources and plans for implementing your vision.

Nutrient Management Planning allows farmers to **budget, supply, and conserve nutrients** for plant productions, minimize agricultural nonpoint source pollution to surface and groundwater, protect air quality, properly utilize manure and organic byproducts as a plant nutrient source and support soil health.

Nutrient Management Planning Class

The six-week Nutrient Management classes are offered every year, usually starting in January, by agronomists from the Champlain Valley Crop, Soil and Pasture Team and the Northwest Crops and Soils Team.

These classes give an overview of nutrient management and help you develop your own farm plan, that meets the NRCS 590 Standard and VT RAPs. The course utilizes the online software tool goCrop™ to create your nutrient management plan and keep records. View goCrop at:

new.gocrop.com/

Farmers participating in the course, and who are developing their Nutrient Management Plan (NMP) will need a current manure analysis, current soil analysis (no older than 3 years) for all fields in their NMP, and a completed Land Treatment Plan (field maps, RUSLE2 values, etc.). Natural Resources Conservation District staff can help to complete all course requirements, and work alongside farmers to create their NMP. The class is free for producers, and NRCD's may also be able to cover the costs of initial soil and manure samples that are required for the LTP. Farmers may also receive financial assistance to write their NMP's through NRCS' Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP).

Nutrient Management Planning Tools & Resources

The Vermont Agency of Agriculture, Food & Markets has developed record keeping booklets for nutrient applications and crop yields. Thorough record keeping is essential to informed farm management and may be required to be eligible or maintain some certifications, and to be in compliance with the Required Agricultural Practices (RAPs) depending on your farm type and size.

The **Vermont Farm Women's Fund** provides stipends and scholarships to help women farmers build thriving businesses and to participate in agricultural policy development. Since 2009, the fund has made 71 awards totaling over \$36,000.

- Nearly 70% percent of Vermont's farms have at least one woman operator.
- Women are the primary producer on a third of Vermont farms.
- Women typically operate smaller farms and earn less than men.
- VFWF stipends and scholarships provide funds that would otherwise be unavailable through other loan and grant programs.
- Awards pay for consulting fees, tuition and registration fees, and associated childcare, replacement labor and travel costs

Scholarship Awards: VFWF will contribute up to 75 percent of class/course/conference registration fees. In certain cases, travel costs, such as lodging and airfare, may also be covered.

Except in cases of extreme financial hardship, the maximum scholarship amount will be \$250.

Agricultural Energy Loan Program

Vermont Economic Development Authority (VEDA)



VEDA helps Vermont agriculture and forest product-based businesses finance qualifying renewable energy generation or energy efficiency improvement projects, and adopt technologies that enhance or support the development and implementation of renewable energy or energy efficiency, or both.

Loan Purposes

- Must relate to a project undertaken by an Agriculture-or Forest product-based company for Renewable Energy Generation and/or Energy
- Efficiency Improvements and/or Energy Technology Purchase of land and buildings, new construction or existing facility renovations or refurbishment
- Purchase and installation of machinery and equipment
- Payment for design, engineering and permit fees relating to an eligible project
- Finance or refinance existing assets or debt relating to an eligible project

Loan Amounts

- In most cases, loans up to \$350,000 may be approved internally by VEDA staff
- Loans exceeding \$350,000 are presented to the VEDA Board monthly for consideration

Vermont Agricultural Credit Program

Vermont Economic Development Authority (VEDA)



VEDA provides credit to Vermont farmers, agricultural facilities, forestry and forest product-based businesses.

Farm loans are available to strengthen existing farm operations, encourage diversification, support beginning farmers, and to encourage marketing and processing of Vermont agricultural and forestry products. "Farm Operations" means the cultivation of land or other uses of land to produce (among other things) food, orchard products, maple syrup or forest crops. Also included is the raising, boarding and training of equines and the raising of livestock.

Forestry Loans

Vermont Economic Development Authority (VEDA)



VEDA recognizes that Vermont forestry and forest products-based businesses are a vital source of innovation, employment, and economic growth in Vermont and have faced challenges related to unpredictable weather events and changing markets. To help these businesses, VEDA created special loan products with subsidized interest rates to meet the working capital and capital-asset financing needs of businesses in the forest products sector with even deeper discounts available for certain low-impact logging equipment*.

Loan Purposes

- Purchase of capital assets such as vehicles, machinery & equipment, including but not limited to log trucks, excavators, feller bunchers and wood processors
- **Purchase of low impact logging equipment***, machinery for implementing Acceptable Management Practices (AMPs), and equipment, supplies and/or management costs that support soil and water conservation, such as flotation wheels/tires
- Pay operating expenses
- Support seasonal working capital needs
- Refinance existing debt at more affordable rates and/or terms

Low-impact logging equipment that protects soil, reduces erosion, and helps keep water clean may be eligible for a loan with an even lower interest rate. This additional discount is possible thanks to support from the Clean Water Fund overseen by the Vermont Department of Forests, Parks, and Recreation (FPR).

Contingent upon approval from VEDA and FPR, qualifying low-impact logging equipment could be eligible for up to an **\$800,000 loan with an interest rate between 2.5% and 3%**. Loggers must also be a LEAP or Master Certified to be eligible for this additional discount.

State Small Business Credit Initiative (SSBCI) Program

Vermont Small Business Development Center (VtSBDC)



SSBCI is a multi-year federal program administered by the U.S. Treasury, providing a combination of credit and investment programs for existing small businesses and start-ups. In addition, the program provides technical assistance for small businesses in the areas of legal, accounting, and finance advisory services, whether they are applying or not for SSBCI capital or other government funding programs.

SSBCI in a nutshell:

- **Technical Assistance:** legal, accounting, and finance advisory services (funded by the program).
- **Legal:** Vermont Law and Graduate School is the program's partner providing one-on-one education and advising on legal matters.
- **Accounting:** QuickBooks clinics are planned with area experts offering training to new users as well as business owners with QuickBooks experience.
- **Finance:** VtSBDC program advisor provides one-on-one advising on identifying sources of credit, capital, and other financing, preparing financial analyses, advising on financial management and factors that may impede access to financing for the business.
- **Capital Access Programs:** debt and venture capital. VtSBDC does not provide funds or grants directly to businesses. Instead, we connect you to SSBCI capital providers.

Sugarhouse Food Safety Certification

Vermont Maple Sugar Makers Association (VMSMA)



VMSMA's Sugarhouse Certification Program is a program **created by sugar makers, for sugar makers** that interprets the current food safety rules for maple operations. While participating in the Certification Program is voluntary, following food safety rules is required for sugar makers. We've worked to anticipate barriers to participating in this program, from cost to templates for processes and procedures. The Program is updated regularly with new regulations, research, and resources, and is now being shared with consumers on VMSMA's website. Certifications are good for 3 years.

How Does the Program Work?

Visit VMSMA's website to learn more about Program Specifics and even test your readiness by reviewing the Certification Checklist. Once you send us your application and payment, we'll assign your Certifier, who will complete documentation review and answer any questions specific to your operation. Your Certifier will then schedule a site visit to work through the rest of the Checklist.

Once the site visit is complete, the Certifier will send us their notes and the Checklist to VMSMA's Certification Manager for review. Within three weeks, we'll send you a list of any corrective actions needed to finish up your Certification.

I'm Ready! What do I do now?

Once you're ready to apply for Certification, complete the Application, save it as a pdf on your computer, and either email or mail to VMSMA. Once the application is received and reviewed, VMSMA will email you an invoice.

In order to participate, you must be a current VMSMA member. If you have not paid for your current calendar year VMSMA membership, you can pay for your current membership fees online. Just log into your member profile on the VMSMA website.

In 2025, CRWFA launched a **Farmer Led Ag Plastics Recycling Pilot**. Keeping it small and manageable, we are beginning with bale wrap, and seeing how the program develops. Our goal is to keep the cost of recycling farm plastic competitive with what you already spend to landfill it.

How It Works

- Contact us, and we'll bring you empty totes.
- Fill them up with clean and dry used bale wrap.
- When one or two are full, contact us again, and we will pick it up and leave more totes.

It Has To Be Clean!

In order for the plastic recyclers to work with us, we need to give them material that is as clean and dry as possible. Only bale wrap (no netting, it's a different plastic). Some moisture and bale juice is okay, but no gravel, no heavy dirt or manure, no snow/ice/water.

If that shows up in the plastic we send them, they may stop taking it from us, or at least dock us pay. We need the best price we can get in order to cover transport costs. So we all need to do our part, take our wrap off and put it right into a clean, dry place until someone picks it up

Farm Credit East's Food Access Infrastructure Initiative financially supports organizations with grants of up to \$50,000 as they work to improve food security in the Northeast. If your organization, or one you know, has an upcoming infrastructure project to further food access, apply for a Food Access Infrastructure Initiative grant.

Farm Credit East's Food Access Infrastructure Initiative financially supports organizations such as food banks, food hubs and other non-profit food distribution and infrastructure organizations/facilities as they work to improve food security in the Northeast. The recipient must be a non-profit organization.

The goals of eligible projects could include but are not limited to:

- Increase produce handling functionality.
- Expand cooler or freezer storage.

The grant funds must be used for capital projects to improve infrastructure improvements like those described above. This includes real estate improvements. This doesn't include vehicles, food production or processing equipment. Grants should not be used for general operating funds.

Nominees should be based in Farm Credit East's territory, although nominees from outside the territory may be eligible if the initiative for which they are being nominated is positively impacting the rural areas of Farm Credit East's territory (Connecticut, Maine, Massachusetts, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Rhode Island and Vermont). Self-nominations are permitted.

Funds will be provided directly to the recipient. Awards will be made at the sole discretion of the selection committee.

Flexible Capital Fund

Flexible Capital Fund



The **Flexible Capital Fund, L3C (Flex Fund)** provides **creative financing in the form of near equity capital** (subordinated debt and revenue based financing (RBF)) to New England's growth-stage companies in sustainable agriculture and food systems, forest products, and clean technology sectors. As the only licensed lender in Vermont to provide revenue based financing (RBF), the Flex Fund invests in Vermont and New England companies that **strengthen or fill a gap in their supply chain**. The Flex Fund is a Community Development Financial Institution (CDFI) lender, which provides advisory and development resources to help portfolio companies grow.

Flexible Finance Options

- We work with a portfolio company to structure a deal (using subordinated debt and/or revenue based financing) that is flexible and meets the cash flow needs of the business.
- Pricing and structure depends on the risk level of the deal, amount of collateral available, strength of the management team, and purpose of the loan.
- In general, less risky loans (priced lower) will consist of subordinated debt, riskier loans will have both a sub-debt and revenue-based component, and high risk loans will be in the form of pure revenue.
- Pricing is significantly less expensive than equity or venture investments but more than traditional secured bank debt.

The Flex Fund's **investments range from \$100,000 to \$400,000**, typically with co-investors, and include the flexibility to provide additional funding as needed. A typical portfolio company will have:

- Established sales, usually greater than \$500,000 per year
- Sales growth forecast of at least 15-20% per year & profit margins that will support a revenue-share payment
- Strong management team and a well-supported growth strategy with market opportunity

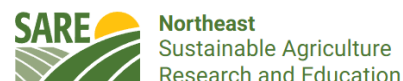

Farmer Grant Program

Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE)



The Northeast SARE Farmer Grant program provides funds to farmers to explore innovative concepts in sustainable agriculture conducted through experiments, surveys, prototypes, on-farm demonstrations or other research and education techniques.

The program **encourages innovative solutions to challenges** in farming and food systems in the Northeast USA, including but not limited to: Marketing and business, Crop production, Raising livestock, Aquaculture, Social sustainability, Unconventional agriculture, Traditional ecological knowledge.

Grant Awards: Awards range from \$5,000-\$50,000. Approximately \$800,000 has been allocated to fund projects for this year's Farmer Grants.

Farmer Grant projects must:

- Be led by a farmer who meets Northeast SARE's definition of a farm: 'Any place from which \$1,000 or more of agricultural products were produced and sold, or normally would have been sold, during the year'
- Collaborate with a technical advisor.
- Impact both the farmer Project Leader and other farms in the region.
- Explore an innovative practice and/or introduce an existing practice to a new audience of farmers.
- Include outreach activities, or sharing of project impacts and results, to farmers beyond the project team and project participants.
- Align with proposal criteria.

Eligible Expenses Include, but are not limited to:

- Labor Costs
- Consultant Compensation
- Research and education supplies, outreach materials
- Publication Costs
- Rental fees for farm equipment, land, greenhouse space, etc.
- Equipment necessary for and specific to the project.

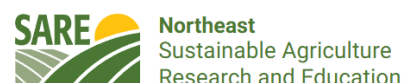

Research and Education Grant Program

Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE)



Northeast SARE's competitive Research and Education Grants provide up to \$250,000 for educational efforts that empower farmers to adopt new behaviors, decision making approaches or practices that enhance farming sustainability in the Northeast.

Research and Education projects give farmers the information, education, resources and, importantly, the confidence they need to adopt more sustainable practices on their farms.

- Most Research and Education projects include on-farm or farmer-led research, but a research component is not required to receive these grants. What is essential is farmer-focused education that addresses a demonstrated farmer need and is designed to lead to real-world changes in farm practices. Any area of sustainability may be addressed by Research and Education projects and recent projects included marketing models, urban farm mentoring, agroforestry, aquaculture and aquaponic research, succession planning and ruminant research.

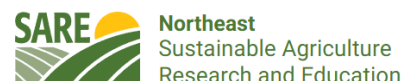

Farming Community Grant Program

Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE)



Northeast SARE's competitive Farming Community Grants provide up to \$250,000 to support social connections, research and education to strengthen farming and food systems at the community level.

Farming Community projects improve the health and sustainability of agricultural communities by developing community partnerships informed by the lived experiences of farmers. These projects encourage collaboration between farmers, service providers, researchers and non-profit organizations to co-create solutions that are responsive to local needs and scalable across the Northeast. This grant program was launched in 2025 and first-year awards included projects focused on farmers' physical and mental health, market gardening for veterans, regenerative urban agriculture, culturally determined market vegetable production, peer-to-peer farmer mentorships, expanding land availability, food security and more.

Research for Novel Approaches in Sustainable Agriculture Grant Program

Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE)



The Northeast SARE Research for Novel Approaches provide funding to test the feasibility and benefits of new sustainability practices in agriculture. There is no set limit on grant awards.

Novel Approaches grants fund proof-of-concept research that builds on prior studies or pilot projects to test, refine and validate new practices or technologies that can improve the sustainability, resilience and economic vitality of farms in the Northeast.

Successful Novel Approaches projects lead to the adoption of new, beneficial practices on farms. These projects can focus on any area of sustainability, including pest management, invasive species, soil health, variety and market development, precision-technology validation, or any other potentially beneficial practice. Researchers must demonstrate that farmers have a real need for the issue the project addresses and that they are interested in adopting the practice if it proves beneficial and feasible.

Professional Development Grant Program

Northeast Sustainable Agriculture Research and Education (SARE)



Northeast SARE's Professional Development Grants provide up to \$150,000 to professionals like extension educators, consultants, agency and non-profit staff to improve their ability to improve their ability to work with farmers.

Professional Development Grants enhance the skills and effectiveness of the people who advise, educate and support farmers in the Northeast. Through research-based education, these professionals learn new practices and skills to better support farmers in sustainable agriculture innovation.

Recent examples include:

- Tribal farm staff trained to develop farming workshops on six Tribal Nations to improve food security
- Realtors and bankers trained in farm-succession planning to support 40 farm families with smooth inter-generational transitions
- Farmers' market managers trained in conflict mediation implemented 124 strategies for farmer vendors, strengthening the livelihoods of 300 farmers and the long-term resilience of farmers' markets in the region
- Extension and non-profit staff trained in farm-business practices, resulting in 117 farmers improving their ability to monitor and assess their farms' financial health

Northeast Dairy Business Innovation Center (NE-DBIC)

NORTHEAST DAIRY BUSINESS
INNOVATION CENTER

This program will fund projects that support dairy farmers in improving their operations for long-term success. This grant supports projects that modernize outdated systems or introduce innovative solutions to improve farm viability, reduce climate impacts, improve milk quality or value, improve worker conditions, and strengthen the farm's ability to respond to challenges.

Competitive projects will take a strategic, systems-level approach, involve expert guidance such as farm planners or technical assistance providers, and may benefit individual farms or groups of farms. Projects that only replace old equipment without broader improvements to farm systems are not eligible.

Grant Awards: \$15,000-\$100,000 with a 25% in-kind and/or cash match contribution. **Please note that this year, this program will have a two-stage application.**

Grants are available to applicants in all 11 Northeast states served by NE-DBIC: Connecticut, Delaware, Maine, Massachusetts, Maryland, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, and Vermont.

How To Apply

1. Review the Request for Pre-Applications (RFA) once it is available. This will contain the complete details on eligible projects/applicants and the full application process. The RFA is expected to be released in October 2026.
2. Register in WebGrants (may take up to two business days).
3. Complete your application in WebGrants, once it opens, using our application guide.

Caledonia County Natural Resources Conservation District assists landowners and municipalities in their management, use and sustainability of natural resources. We focus and coordinate any available technical, financial, and educational resources for this purpose and partner with federal, state, municipal and local partners in a collaborative process to broaden opportunities, focus common resources, and stay abreast of current natural resources programs.

Nutrient Management Planning

We help farms comply with Vermont's Required Agricultural Practices. Each year, we offer personalized support for farmers to enroll in UVM Extension's six-week Nutrient Management Planning class to create their certified NMP and learn to use the goCrop software. We also assist with annual NMP updates, including soil and manure sampling, records entering, nutrient recommendations, and plan revisions.

Program Navigation Services

We are available to meet with you one-on-one to learn about your goals and help connect you with the technical resources and funding opportunities to achieve them. We also can help with grant writing and reporting for farm, forest, and conservation projects of all sizes.

Stream Projects

We partner with municipalities and landowners to design and implement stream and floodplain restoration. We support large scale infrastructure projects such as strategic wood additions, dam and barrier removals, and culvert upgrades to improve water quality, habitat, flood resiliency, and overall health of our watersheds. We also offer free tree planting services for riparian buffers on agricultural lands through our Trees for Streams Program.

Education and Outreach

We collaborate with our community to support locally led conservation initiatives and provide meaningful educational opportunities for adults and youth throughout Caledonia County. These include workshops and events on a variety of topics from establishing pollinator gardens to reducing on-farm compaction. Have a workshop you'd like us to host? Let us know!

NRCD – Essex County

Essex County Natural Resources Conservation District



Essex County NRCD (ECNRCD) supports locally-led conservation and the working lands of Essex County. We deliver services to meet existing and emerging community, natural resources and environmental needs by providing education, outreach and technical assistance for local residents and municipalities.

Nutrient Management Planning: We assist farms of all sizes with Land Treatment Plans, new NMPs through the UVM Extension class, and updates. We also offer regular soil, manure, and crop tissue testing to farms of all sizes.

Program Navigation: We help farms and forest managers navigate available state, federal, and private grant programs, select the programs that best meet their needs and interests, and assist with application and reporting.

Conservation Planning: We offer conservation planning through NRCS programs for agricultural and forest landowners. Where NRCS financial assistance programs are not the right fit, we will assist with planning farmer-funded conservation projects. Through Trees for Streams, we offer planning, implementation, and stewardship services for riparian buffers on agricultural lands.

Locally-Led Conservation: We host public forums, community meals, and partner work groups to identify critical issues around agriculture, forestry, and natural resources in Essex County. In FY2027, this process led to the creation of a local fund pool through the NRCS EQIP program focused on forestry and upland wildlife habitat practices.

ECNRCD Nursery: We operate a small conservation nursery that produces native trees grown from NEK-collected seeds and cuttings. Ottauquechee Natural Resources Conservation District



The Ottauquechee Natural Resources Conservation District (ONRCD), founded in 1944, helps individuals, groups, and communities in eighteen towns in Windsor County, and one in Rutland County, by providing education, information and technical assistance relating to conservation issues.

Water Quality Monitoring

ONRCD volunteers and partners collect samples from the Ottauquechee River and several streams around the District to help keep tabs on the health of our waterways and public swim waters.

Skidder Bridge Rental

Portable skidder bridges help protect water quality during timber harvesting by reducing stream bank and streambed disturbance compared to alternative methods. Cost-effective, reusable, and easy to transport and install, they are an increasingly popular choice by land stewards. ONRCD offers a rental program for durable wooden skidder bridges for \$100 per month.

Stream Simulator

The District demonstrates the widely acclaimed "River Roadshow" at various events around the region; an interactive and fascinating scale model of an active river, the "Roadshow" allows viewers to see how rivers work in real time and to participate safely in the impacts of manipulation such as dredging, straightening, and development. The River Roadshow, purchased with and sustained by funding from the VT Community Foundation, is available for rent to area schools, along with an accompanying curriculum developed just for this tool.

Riparian Buffer Planting

Establishing a healthy buffer of vegetation between human land uses and streams and rivers is one of the best and most cost effective ways to protect water quality. There are funding sources available to cover the cost of trees and labor for eligible landowners to restore riparian buffers.

Partnerships

ONRCD realizes the value of connecting with and working with local and regional partners, such as the CT River Watershed Farmers Alliance, Vermont Institute of Natural Science, Sustainable Woodstock, CT River Conservancy, Greater Upper Valley Trout Unlimited, and our neighboring Districts (Windham County NRCD and White River NRCD).

The District also has two 10ft Haybuster no-till drills for cover crop and reduced tillage practices, as well as an 8ft GenTill aerator to assist with manure incorporation and compaction reduction. Soil sampling probes and other equipment are available upon request.

Nutrient Management Planning

If you need a nutrient management plan (NMP) for your farm, the District can provide assistance. The District assists farms with nutrient management plan development.

Benefits of signing up for this program include:

The WNRCD provides support to producers through many different avenues including NMP development, soil testing, grant writing, farm team development, and connections to other state and government resources and programs.

The Winooski District has two agriculture specialists that work with a variety of producers. **They have been helping primarily dairy and beef producers, but are hoping to expand their technical assistance services into other farming avenues as well.** They recently waived the fees for soil lab tests for all ag producers until June 2026 and hope to continue this program in the future to keep supporting producers.

Having two certified conservation planners on the Winooski NRCD staff, we also work closely with USDA-NRCS. Our agricultural conservation specialists work with private individuals to identify resource concerns and provide conservation solutions to current issues, helping preserve and maintain the integrity of Vermont's landscape. As a part of conservation planning, the Winooski District also leads the locally led conservation planning process for our district ensuring that local concerns are at the forefront of conservation planning efforts.

They additionally provide technical assistance in state programming including Vermont Pay for Performance, farm assistance program and trees for streams and other state grants. They are available for any grant writing support or questions. In addition, our two agricultural producers can help write Nutrient Management plans for your farm and get them approved.

The district also **conducts training and workshops for farmers** in our service area. In 2026, we plan to host more farmer forums, which will be open discussion groups for farmers to tell the district what services they benefit the most from.

Farm Service Agency (FSA)



The **Conservation Reserve Program (CRP)**, administered by the Farm Service Agency (FSA), is a voluntary program that encourages agricultural producers and landowners to convert highly erodible and other environmentally sensitive acreage to vegetative cover, such as native grasses, trees, and riparian buffers.

Annual Rental Payments/Cost Sharing/Incentive Payments:

- Participants receive annual rental payments for a 10 or 15 year period based on soil productivity and the average cash rental rates in the county
- Cost-share assistance of 50% of the cost of establishing approved conservation practices
- Sign-up Incentive Payment based on enrolled acreage and rental rate. Practice Incentive Payment of 50% of the cost of establishing approved conservation practices
- NOTE: Incentive payments differ from the Conservation Reserve Enhancement Program (CREP) that is run in partnership with Vermont Agency of Agriculture Food and Markets (refer to the Table of Contents)

Enrollment Options:

- General CRP: Annual signups where offers are ranked and selected based on environmental benefits
- Continuous CRP: Allows enrollment of eligible land without competitive ranking. This includes high-priority practices such as filter strips, riparian buffers, and grass waterways
- Grassland CRP: Focuses on preserving grasslands and promoting sustainable grazing practices

Emergency Conservation Program (ECP)

Farm Service Agency (FSA)



The **Emergency Conservation Program (ECP)**, administered by the U.S. Department of Agriculture (USDA) Farm Service Agency (FSA), provides emergency funding and technical assistance to farmers and ranchers to rehabilitate farmland and conservation structures damaged by natural disasters and implement emergency water conservation measures in periods of severe drought.

Cost Share Payments:

- Up to 75% of the approved payment scenario cost to implement approved restoration practices
- Up to 90% of the approved payment scenario cost to implement approved restoration practices for producers who certify as limited resource, socially disadvantaged, or beginning farmers/ranchers
- Limited to \$500,000 per person or legal entity per disaster
- Advance payment of up to 25% of expected cost-share available

Practices:

- Removing debris from farmland: cleanup of wind- or water-deposited debris, such as woody material, sand, rock, and trash on cropland or pastureland
- Grading, shaping or leveling land: filling gullies, re-leveling irrigated farmland, and incorporating sand and silt
- Restoring fences: livestock cross fences, boundary fences, cattle gates, or wildlife exclusion fence on agricultural land
- Restoring conservation structures: waterways, terraces, diversion ditches, and permanently installed ditching system
- Providing emergency water during periods of severe drought to livestock or existing irrigation systems for orchards or vineyards

Dairy Margin Coverage (DMC) Program

Farm Service Agency (FSA)



The **Dairy Margin Coverage (DMC) Program**, administered by the Farm Service Agency (FSA), is a voluntary risk management tool for dairy producers. It offers financial assistance when the margin between the all-milk price and average feed cost falls below a coverage level chosen by the producer. By participating in DMC, dairy farmers can protect themselves against declines in milk prices and increases in feed costs, thereby ensuring more predictable and stable income. The program includes both catastrophic coverage and additional, higher levels of coverage for an annual premium.

An eligible dairy operation must:

- Have a production history determined by the USDA FSA
- Be registered to participate during a signup announced by FSA
- Pay a \$100 administrative fee annually for each year of participation, except if the dairy operation qualifies for a waiver for limited resource, beginning, socially disadvantaged, or veteran farmers and ranchers
- Select a coverage level ranging from \$4.00 to \$9.50 per hundredweight in \$0.50 increments
- Select a coverage percentage of the dairy operation's production history ranging from 5% to 95%, in 5% increments

If a dairy is operated by more than one producer, it will be registered as a single operation. If producers operate two or more dairies, each operation will be registered separately.

Eligible program participants in DMC are also eligible to participate in the Livestock Gross Margin for Dairy Producers Program and the Dairy Revenue Protection Program administered by the Risk Management Agency.

Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) & Price Loss Coverage (PLC)

The Agriculture Risk Coverage (ARC) and Price Loss Coverage (PLC) programs, administered by the Farm Service Agency (FSA), offer financial assistance to agricultural producers. The ARC program provides payments when the actual revenue for a farm is less than a guarantee set based on historical data and market conditions. The PLC program provides payments when the effective price for a covered commodity falls below its effective reference price. These programs aim to protect farmers from significant income losses due to fluctuations in crop prices or revenue shortfalls.

Covered Commodities:

- 22 covered commodities including wheat, oats, barley, corn, grain sorghum, long grain rice, medium/short grain rice, temperate japonica rice, seed cotton, dry peas, lentils, large and small chickpeas soybeans, peanuts, sunflower seed, canola, flaxseed, mustard seed, rapeseed, safflower, crambe, and sesame seed
- Program-specific reference prices and revenue guarantees

Payment Triggers:

- ARC payments are triggered when actual revenue falls below the guaranteed level
- PLC payments are triggered when market year average prices fall below the effective reference price

Benefits:

- Provides financial support during periods of low prices or revenue shortfalls
- Helps stabilize income for farmers and ranchers
- Offers a safety net against market volatility
- Financial stability: offers a safety net to manage market price and revenue risks
- Income support: helps maintain farm income stability during economic downturns
- Flexibility: Producers can choose between ARC and PLC based on their individual needs and commodity markets

Food Safety Certification for Specialty Crops (FSCSC) Program

Farm Service Agency (FSA)



The **Food Safety Certification for Specialty Crops (FSCSC)** program provides financial assistance for specialty crop operations that incur eligible on-farm food safety program expenses related to obtaining or renewing a food safety certification. This program helps offset costs to comply with regulatory requirements and market-driven food safety certification requirements.

To be eligible for FSCSC, an applicant must have obtained or renewed a 2025 food safety certification that was issued between June 2025 and December 31st, 2025, or a 2026 food safety certification issued during the 2026 calendar year and have paid eligible expenses.

Disaster Programs

Farm Service Agency (FSA)



USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) administers several disaster programs approved and funded by congress or within the Farm Bill that will aid agricultural producers who have suffered losses due to qualifying natural disaster events or weather-related causes. For 2026 several new programs have been activated in response to the 2023 and 2024 flooding or potentially the 2025 drought.

Covered Commodities: coverage varies by program. Program specific reference prices and revenue guarantee also vary by program.

Payment Triggers: based on financial or production losses, and vary depending on the program.

Benefits: 1. Provides a portion of financial support after a disaster or weather-related loss has occurred. 2. Income Support: Helps maintain farm income stability after disaster events.

ELAP: The Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm-raised Fish Program provides financial assistance to eligible producers for livestock, honeybee, and farm-raised fish losses – such as death, feed, grazing, and associated transportation costs – due to disease and certain adverse weather events or loss conditions. This program addresses losses not covered by other USDA disaster assistance programs. This program would provide assistance with transporting water to livestock, hauling feed to livestock, or transporting livestock.

EFRP: The Emergency Forest Restoration Program offers financial payments to eligible private forest landowners who restore forests damaged by natural disasters or insect and disease infestation. This program would require tree mortality to be observed and therefore would likely not be implemented until a year or more following the actual drought. NOTE: This program would not be of use to maple sugar producers who experience a reduced yield. Reduced yield would be covered by the NAP program. This is a Cost Share Program.

TAP: The Tree Assistance Program helps orchardists and nursery tree growers replant or rehabilitate eligible trees, bushes, and vines damaged by natural disasters and eligible plant disease. Plant mortality may not be evident until after the drought is resolved but producers would still be eligible for these benefits. Must apply within 90 days of the disaster.

Farm Service Agency (FSA)



LFP: The Livestock Forage Disaster Program provides compensation to eligible livestock producers who have suffered grazing losses on native or improved pastureland with permanent vegetative cover, or land planted specifically for grazing. The grazing losses must be due to a qualifying drought condition during the normal grazing period for a county. Eligible counties must experience D2 conditions for 8 consecutive weeks or D3 at any singular time. Entire county is eligible if any part of the county is classified as described. *Application deadline for 2025 losses is March 1, 2026.*

LIP: The Livestock Indemnity Program provides benefits to livestock producers for livestock deaths in excess of normal mortality caused by adverse weather or by attacks by animals reintroduced into the wild by the federal government. It also provides assistance to eligible livestock owners that must sell livestock at a reduced price because of an injury from an eligible loss condition. *Application deadline for 2025 losses is March 1, 2026.*

MLP: Milk Loss Program provides payments to eligible dairy operations for milk that was dumped or removed without compensation from the commercial milk market because of a qualifying weather-related event in 2023 and/or 2024. *Sign up ends January 23, 2026.*

OFSCLP: On-Farm Stored Commodity Loss Program provided assistance to producers who suffered losses of eligible harvested commodities while stored in on-farm structures in 2023 and/or 2024 due to a qualifying natural disaster event. *Sign up ends January 23, 2026.*

SDRP: Supplemental Disaster Relief Program provides assistance to producers for necessary expenses due to losses of revenue, quality or production of crops due to weather related events in 2023 and 2024. There are two stages, one for covered losses (producers with NAP coverage or crop insurance) and one for uncovered losses. Participation requires subsequent risk management.

Deadline for Stage 1 and 2 applications is April 30, 2026.

Farm Loan Programs

Farm Service Agency (FSA)



The Farm Service Agency (FSA) makes direct and guaranteed farm ownership and operating loans to family-size farmers and ranchers who cannot obtain credit from a bank, Farm Credit System institution, or other conventional lender. **FSA loans can be used to purchase land, livestock, equipment, feed, seed, and supplies. Loans can also be used to construct buildings or make farm improvements.**

- Many FSA loans are available as either Guaranteed Loans or Direct Loans
- Direct Loans are made by FSA, working directly with the farmer.
- Guaranteed Loans are made by a USDA-approved lender with the FSA guaranteeing a percentage of any loss
- Farm loan rates, terms, and maximum amounts vary based on loan type

Farm Operating Loans can be used to purchase livestock, seed, and equipment. It can also cover farm operating costs and family living expenses while a farm gets up and running.

Farm Ownership Loans may be used to purchase or expand a farm or ranch. These loans can help with paying closing costs, constructing or improving buildings on the farm, or help conserve and protect soil and water resources.

Microloans are a type of Operating or Farm Ownership Loan. They're designed to meet the needs of small and beginning farmers, or for non-traditional and specialty operations by easing some of the requirements and offering less paperwork.

Youth Loans are a type of Operating Loan for young people between 10-20 years old who need assistance with an educational agricultural project.

Emergency Loans help farmers and ranchers recover from production and physical losses due to drought, flooding, other natural disasters or losses.

Beginning Farmer Loans are set aside as a portion of FSA loan funds for family farmers who are just getting started on their journey in farming.

Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP)

Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)



The **Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP)** provides **technical and financial assistance to help producers address natural resource concerns** like soil quality, rangeland health, irrigation efficiency, nutrient management, and forest quality on working lands, including cropland, rangeland, pasture, and non-industrial private forest land.

The One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBBA) delivers the largest long-term investment in NRCS conservation programs in decades, delivering over \$34 billion through fiscal year 2031, including more than \$18.3 billion for EQIP. This increase in funding ensures conservation remains rooted in agriculture, with benefits to producers, communities and natural resources.

NRCS offers about 200 practices designed for working farms, ranches, and forests. This also includes practices used in the Regenerative Pilot Program, an outcomes-based approach to conservation, addressing whole farm resource concerns through regenerative agriculture conservation plans. NRCS financial assistance can cover part of the costs of implementing conservation practices

Through EQIP, NRCS provides agricultural producers with one-on-one help and financial assistance to plan and implement improvements through conservation practices. Together, NRCS and producers invest in solutions that conserve natural resources for the future while improving agricultural operations.

NRCS will help producers develop a conservation plan that meets their goals and vision. This plan becomes their roadmap for selecting the right conservation practices for their land.

Conservation Innovation Grants (CIG)

Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)



Conservation Innovation Grants (CIG) are competitive grants that drive public and private sector innovation in resource conservation. CIG projects inspire creative problem-solving—helping to boost production on farms, ranches, and private forests through improvements in water quality, soil health, and wildlife habitat.

CIG is supported by the One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBBA), which increased funding for farm bill conservation programs, like the Environmental Quality Incentives Program (EQIP), which funds CIG. OBBBA strengthens the ability of USDA's Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) to support farmers, ranchers, and partners in tackling conservation challenges at the landscape scale.

CIG Classic

CIG Classic is a national competition for projects that support the development and piloting of new tools, practices and technologies to further natural resource conservation on private lands.

CIG On-Farm Conservation Innovation Trials (On-Farm Trials)

CIG On-Farm Conservation Innovation Trials is a national competition for projects that support more widespread adoption and evaluation of innovative conservation approaches in partnership with agricultural producers. On-Farm Trials awardees provide technical assistance and incentive payments to producers to help compensate for risks associated with implementation of new conservation practices, systems and approaches. Awardees also evaluate the environmental, financial and social impacts of implementing innovative approaches.

National CIG projects are awarded through a nationwide competitive grants process, typically once per year. Projects can be watershed-based, regional, multi-state, or nationwide in scope. The natural resource concerns eligible for funding through CIG are identified in the funding announcement and may change annually to focus on new and emerging, high-priority natural resource concerns. **When a competition opens, information on the opportunity and instructions for how to apply will be posted on grants.gov and on the NRCS website.**

Agricultural Management Assistance (AMA) Program

Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)



Agricultural Management Assistance (AMA) helps agricultural producers manage financial risk through diversification, marketing or natural resource conservation practices. NRCS administers the conservation provisions while Agricultural Marketing Service and Risk Management Agency implement the production diversification and marketing provisions.

AMA is available in 16 states where participation in the Federal Crop Insurance Program is historically low: Connecticut, Delaware, Hawaii, Maine, Maryland, Massachusetts, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Rhode Island, Utah, Vermont, West Virginia, and Wyoming.

How It Works: NRCS works with producers to develop an AMA plan of operations. Producers may construct or improve water management structures or irrigation structures; plant trees for windbreaks or to improve water quality; and mitigate risk through production diversification or resource conservation practices, including soil erosion control, integrated pest management, or transition to organic farming

Contracts are for a minimum of one year after completion of the last practice, but not more than 10 years. Participants are expected to maintain cost-shared practices for the life of the practice. AMA provides financial assistance up to 75 percent of the cost of installing conservation practices. The total AMA payments (from NRCS, AMS, and RMA) shall not exceed \$50,000 per participant for any fiscal year.

Eligibility

Applicants must own or control the land within an identified AMA state and comply with adjusted gross income limitation provisions. Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP)

Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)



The **Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP)** helps agricultural producers build on their existing conservation efforts while strengthening their operation. CSP pays participants for conservation performance – the higher the performance, the higher the payment. The **One Big Beautiful Bill Act (OBBBA)** delivers the largest long-term investment in NRCS conservation programs in decades, delivering over \$34 billion through fiscal year (FY) 2031, including more than \$7.7 billion for CSP. This increase in funding ensures conservation remains rooted in agriculture, with benefits to producers, communities and natural resources.

CSP addresses various resource concerns including soil quality, soil erosion, water quality, water quantity, air quality, plant resources, and animal resources as well as energy by helping producers maintain and improve their existing conservation systems and adopt additional conservation activities to address priority resource concerns.

CSP Contracts

For producers who are already taking steps to improve the condition of their land, CSP can help them find new ways to meet their goals.

Whether they are looking to improve grazing conditions, increase crop resiliency, or develop wildlife habitat, NRCS can custom design a CSP plan to help meet those goals. **NRCS can help identify natural resource problems in an operation and provide technical and financial assistance to solve those problems** or attain higher stewardship levels in an environmentally beneficial and cost-effective manner.

This also includes practices used in **the Regenerative Pilot Program**, an outcomes-based approach to conservation, addressing whole farm resource concerns through regenerative agriculture conservation plans.

Applicants may include individuals, legal entities, joint operations, or Indian tribes that meet the stewardship threshold for at least two priority resource concerns when they apply. They must also agree to meet or exceed the stewardship threshold for at least one additional priority resource concern by the end of the contract. Producers must have effective control of the land for the term of the proposed contract.

Vermont Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP)

Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)



The Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP) helps landowners, land trusts, and other entities protect, restore, and enhance wetlands, grasslands, working farms, and ranches through conservation easements. **Under the Agricultural Land Easements (ALE) component**, NRCS helps private and tribal landowners, land trusts, and other entities protect croplands and grasslands on working farms and ranches by limiting non-agricultural uses of the land through conservation easements that prevent the conversion of productive working landscapes to non-agricultural uses.

Cost-Share Information: NRCS provides up to 50% of the appraised conservation easement value for a permanent easement. The remaining purchase of the easement comes from the participating eligible entity, a landowner donation, or a combination of the two.

Applications must be submitted through an eligible entity, such as a land trust, and are not submitted directly to NRCS. Land eligible for agricultural easements includes private or Tribal land that is agricultural land, cropland, rangeland, grassland, pastureland, and nonindustrial private forest land. Eligible land types must also meet one of the four following land eligibility criteria:

1. Parcels enrolled to protect Prime, Unique, or Other productive soil.
2. Parcels enrolled to provide protection of grazing uses and related conservation values.
3. Parcels containing historical or archeological resources.
4. Land that furthers a state or local policy consistent with the purposes of ACEP-ALE.

Wetland Reserve Easement (WRE)

Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS)



The Agricultural Conservation Easement Program (ACEP) helps landowners, land trusts, and other entities protect, restore, and enhance wetlands, grasslands, and working farms and ranches through conservation easements. **Under the Wetlands Reserve Easements (WRE) component, NRCS helps to restore, protect, and enhance enrolled wetlands which have been previously degraded.** NRCS enters a purchase agreement with eligible private landowners and Indian tribes that include the right for NRCS to develop and implement a Wetland Reserve Plan of Operations. WREs provide habitat for fish and wildlife, including threatened and endangered species, improving water quality by filtering sediments and chemicals, reduce flooding, recharge groundwater, protect biological diversity, and provide opportunities for educational scientific, and limited recreation activities.

Eligible Landowners Include

- Owners of privately held land including land that is held by American Indian tribes.
- All landowners who meet the adjusted gross income (AGI) limitations, including all members of landowner-legal entities, and those compliant with the Highly Erodible Land and Wetland Conservation provisions of the Food Security Act of 1985.

Eligible Land Includes

- Land eligible for wetland reserve easements includes privately held farmed or converted wetland that can be successfully and cost-effectively restored. NRCS will prioritize applications based on the easement's potential for protecting and enhancing habitat for migratory birds and other wildlife.

How Does It Work?

To enroll land through wetland reserve easements, NRCS enters into purchase agreements with eligible private landowners or Indian tribes that include the right for NRCS to develop and implement a Wetland Reserve Plan of Operations (WRPO). This plan will detail practices to help restore, protect and enhance the wetlands functions and values.

Partners for Fish and Wildlife

United States Fish & Wildlife Service (USFWS)



The Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program provides free technical and financial assistance to landowners, managers, tribes, corporations, schools, and nonprofits interested in **improving wildlife habitat on their land**. Since 1987, they have helped more than 60,000 landowners restore more than 7 million acres of forest, prairie, wetland, and stream habitat for wildlife.

Through the Partners for Fish and Wildlife Program staff from the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service can assist landowners interested in restoring and enhancing wildlife habitat on their land.

Services Offered Include:

- Assistance to plan, implement, and monitor projects
- Identifying project partners
- Identifying funding resources
- Providing permitting guidance

Process

A biologist will consult with landowners to help them conserve and improve wildlife habitat at no cost through planning, design, and supervision of restoration projects. Services also include identification of other funding sources and offering permitting guidance. Landowners continue to own and manage their land while they improve conditions for wildlife. Many Partners for Fish and Wildlife projects take place on working landscapes such as forests, farms, and ranches. USFWS focuses on upland forests, wetlands, native prairies, marshes, rivers, and streams. Migratory birds, as well as endangered, threatened, and at-risk species, are considered.

Value-Added Producer Grants

Rural Development

Value-Added Producer Grants (VAPGs) help agricultural producers generate new products, create or expand marketing opportunities, and increase producer income.

The Value-Added Producer Grant (VAPG) program helps U.S. agricultural producers enter into value-added activities that:

- Generate new products from raw agricultural commodities
- Create and expand marketing opportunities
- Increase producer income through enhanced product value and market reach

These grants support either:

- Planning activities (e.g., feasibility studies, business and marketing plans)
- Working capital needs (e.g., processing, packaging, advertising, inventory, and salaries)

Grant Awards:

- Planning Grants: Up to \$50,000
- Working Capital Grants: Up to \$200,000
- A one-to-one match is required, which may include cash or eligible in-kind contributions

Applicants may receive priority consideration if they meet any of the following criteria:

- Beginning farmer or rancher
- Veteran farmer or rancher
- Socially disadvantaged farmer or rancher
- Small or medium-sized farm or ranch structured as a family farm
- Farmer or rancher cooperative
- Proposing a Mid-Tier Value Chain project

Additionally, 10% of total funds are reserved for:

- Beginning, veteran, and socially disadvantaged farmers/ranchers
- Mid-tier value chain proposals
- Food safety projects where the majority of funds improve market access

Food Animals Concerns Trust (FACT)



Food Animal Concerns Trust (FACT) believes that all food-producing animals should be raised in a humane and healthy manner and that everyone should have access to safe and **humanely produced food**. Many past grant projects have focused on **fencing, watering systems, or mobile animal shelters**. Farmers have also completed a variety of unique projects involving constructing **cattle scratching stations**, planting trees to improve access to shade, and purchasing equipment for **fly control**.

This year we will specifically fund:

- Grants for farmers seeking to become Certified Animal Welfare Approved (AWA), Certified Humane, or Global Animal Partnership (GAP) Animal Welfare Certified (steps 4 to 5+). These grants will be made for on-farm projects that help improve animal welfare.
- Grants for welfare-certified farmers: These grants are for projects that would help farms that already hold one of the certifications above to build capacity or maintain certification. These grants can be for production-related projects, or for projects related to the marketing, sales, and distribution of certified products.
- Grants for farmers to improve or expand pasture for their animals: FACT will fund projects that would help farms transition to pasture-based systems, expand animals' access to well-managed pasture, and improve the quality of pasture for animals.

Eligible expense categories generally include materials, supplies, equipment, shipping costs, professional fees, travel, training, and hired labor costs.

Ineligible expenses include: operational expenses such as animals, feed, and land; and projects related to the slaughter of animals.

- 501(c)(3) agricultural nonprofits in operation for minimum 3 years may apply; must submit 501(c)(3) documentation and board list.
- For profit farms must be active for at least 2 years.
- Applicants may re-apply for the same project or a different one if they have not been funded in earlier grant cycles.
- Only one application per farm per cycle is allowed.

Ineligible For Funding

- Project budgets & items including; hydro/aquaponic systems, land purchases, labor, consultants, administrative costs, general marketing, one-time experiences, or any projects relying on outside grant funding for completion.
